ASKING
<b>James 1:5</b> gives the believer a command to "ask God" for wisdom. Why do you think the Lord wants us to ask Him for wisdom? What does asking accomplish in the life of a believer?

#### **DOUBLE-MINDED**

**Matthew 6:24** is another teaching from Jesus about the danger of being double-minded: "**No one can** serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money."

The Greek word translated "double-minded" is *dipsuchos*, from *dis*, meaning "twice," and *psuche*, meaning "mind." James uses it to describe someone who is divided in his interests or loyalties, wavering, uncertain, two-faced, half-hearted. Can you think of a time when you were tempted to be double-minded or to serve two masters?

How did God use the experience to teach you something spiritually valuable?

#### Let's Live It Out:

In this you rejoice, though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been grieved by various trials, so that the tested genuineness of your faith—more precious than gold that perishes though it is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honor at the revelation of Jesus Christ.

I Peter 1:6-7

Most of us would testify that our times of greatest spiritual growth have been when we were in the fire of trials and difficulty. For God to train us in His ways, He permits His fire to consume us. This fire causes us to die more to ourselves so that He can live more fully through us.
