Sermon Title: Keep Yourself from Idols

Scripture Passage: 1 John 5:21

Getting Started Sharing from personal experience

1. We are down to the very last verse in our study of 1 John (5:21) which says, "Little children, keep yourselves from idols." At first glance, you might wonder, "Where did that come from?" John hasn't been saying anything about idolatry. He hasn't mentioned it in the entire book. So, is it out of context? But if you think about it, doesn't it actually sum up his entire message? Isn't idolatry making up your own god as a substitute for the one true God, who has revealed Himself in Jesus Christ?

Is there a time in your life when you had an "idol" that you served as more important than God? What was it and why was it so alluring?

Observation Discovering the context

- 2. Study Galatians 1:4. What is it that God came to rescue us from?
- 3. Study 2 Corinthians 10:5. How do the "idols" in our lives qualify as things that "raise up against the knowledge of God?" This one will take some thought.
- 4. Study Ezekiel 14:3. What do you think God meant when He said, "...these men have taken their idols into their hearts, and set the stumbling block of their iniquity before their faces?" What was it that they actually did and how were their idols responsible for it?

5.	Idolatry is a conflict of loyalties. Search your Bible and discover 3 scriptures that speak to being loyal and faithful to honor God and him alone as the one true God, worthy of ALL our praise and loyalty. Ok, I'll give you one, and you only have to discover two more! ©

Inter	pretation Discovering the meaning Psalm 135:15-18 says, "The idols of the nations are silver and gold, the work of human hands. ¹⁶ They have mouths, but do not speak; they have eyes, but do not see; ¹⁷ they have ears, but do not hear, nor is there any breath in their mouths. ¹⁸ Those who make them become like them, so do all who trust in them." What does the Lord mean when He says, "Those who make them will be like them, and so will all who trust in them?"
